Performance Art Denounces Wells Fargo's Harmful Policies

San Andreas, CA is the location of Friday's peaceful vigil for justice, during which the public can be educated on the terrorism conducted by Wells Fargo's dollar votes: the Dakota Access Pipeline. **Friday February 24th** at noon is when local farmers and friends will support the Lakota people of Standing Rock, North Dakota, and their cause of protecting the watersheds of North America from poisonous activities funded by Wells Fargo and 16 other banks. The location is the **corner of Treat and St. Charles** in San Andreas, and the event is in solidarity with water protectors of the Midwest, as one of hundreds of demonstrations nationwide this month.

The Native American led movement began calling upon customers to divest from Wells Fargo in Autumn, 2016, and telling the banks to quit supporting the violence against environmental protectors by pulling funding away from Energy Transfer Partners (ETP) and its vicious work known as the Dakota Access Pipeline (DAPL), under the guidance of ETP. Dozens of opponents of DAPL have been hospitalized by police and other DAPL operatives since September, and hundreds have been arrested.

A local Catholic Worker farmer joining the demonstration this week is Marcus Collonge, who says, "we are simply joining the mounting international pressure for this bank to immediately stop the foolish investment in reckless disregard for people and the waters of North Dakota. It's not too late for Wells Fargo to cancel their financial dealings with ETP."
